After nearly 28 years, this organization was a secret aem in Alexandria, impacting the lives of hundreds of

It was then that I realized my personal goal as Executive Director: to ensure that Community Lodgings would achieve the sustainable funding and recognition it needed and deserved in order to continue to impact the lives of Alexandria's most vulnerable families.

Over the past few years, with help from our wonderful donors, volunteers and community members, we have put processes and structures in place to support the long-term success of the agency including a revised strategic plan, a new website, and the implementation of a sustainable funding model. We are so energized by the accomplishments made possible by your involvement and are more committed than ever to empowering every child and family that Community Lodgings serves to move out of poverty and into self-sufficient lives through housing and education.

Community Lodgings will soon be renovating some of our affordable housing units. This renovation will provide low-income families access to housing that is decent, safe and affordable. We are also expanding our educational offerings for adults in our community. English Language Learner (ELL) classes, computer training, financial literacy and home-ownership workshops are just the beginning. We attribute the success of Community Lodgings to those within our community who support our mission day after day. With your continued support, we will help more homeless and working poor families build a stronger future.

Our History

Since Community Lodgings was founded by local churches in 1987, our goal has been to improve the lives of Alexandria's working poor and families transitioning from homelessness to self-sufficiency. With continued support from the community, five buildings were purchased in the neighborhood to increase affordable housing options.

Today in Alexandria, there are many homeless and low-income families in need of our support. With 44 apartments available at below-market rent (including six transitional housing units), Community Lodgings gives local families access to affordable housing while also offering supportive services to families transitioning to self-sufficient lives.

In addition to housing, Community Lodgings provides children and parents with an educational foundation for success. Since 1998, when we first opened computer literacy and English Language Learner (ELL) classes to adults, we have committed ourselves to improving outcomes for families at risk of homelessness, gang involvement, substance abuse, and physical or emotional abuse. In 2002, we opened the community-based Fifer Family Learning Center to meet the needs of the surrounding community and since then we have expanded to two more learning centers: New Brookside and Brent Place.




Students of all ages now attend free after-school and summer programs, meet with tutors and mentors, learn valuable life skills, and participate in various enrichment and recreational activities. While their children take advantage of the Youth Education Program (YEP), parents are able to attend workshops and mentoring sessions to improve their skills in areas like finance and nutrition. We promote these programs because we strongly believe that education is the path out of poverty.

One Girl Empowered

At Community Lodgings we believe that education is the path out of poverty and Elisa Castro is a prime example of that philosophy. She took advantage of the opportunities presented to her by Community Lodgings and was empowered to improve her life through higher education.

As an eight year resident of Community Lodgings' affordable housing, Elisa spent six years in our Youth Education Program. Growing up with a mother who speaks very little English, Elisa's dream of going to college seemed out of reach. But with two younger siblings looking up to her, Elisa was determined to meet her goal.



In seventh grade Elisa began attending Community Lodgings' Afterschool program where she was able to pursue her dream of academic success. There she took advantage of tutoring and grew to rely on our staff for their support and encouragement. "They always push the students and want the best for them," said Elisa about her time in the learning centers, "Without that extra push, I might not have made it."

In addition to the push she received in the Afterschool program, Elisa was one of the first to participate in our Girls' Mentoring Program. Here she developed a support group that helped her increase her confidence and encouraged her to succeed. According to Gwen Spitzhoff, staff lead on our mentoring programs, "Elisa always had good advice to offer to the younger girls and led by example. She is a natural leader, pushing other students around her to achieve greatness."

Elisa attended Community Lodgings' summer youth job readiness program for two years in a row, dedicated herself to a college preparation class in school, and applied to as many colleges and scholarships as she could. All of this dedication has paid off: she was accepted to Old Dominion University! On top of this amazing achievement, Elisa received two scholarships from local organizations that will ensure this dream becomes a reality for her.




